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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Dillard Street Elementary School serves 507 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 38% Hispanic and 62% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 73% White, 22% Black, 1% Native, 1% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Tiffany Smid and Assistant Principal Felicia Smith. Dillard Street Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books, Chess Club, and Green Team.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Dillard Street Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2006 and the number of books per student is 18. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Dillard Street Elementary School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Age of Collection
 - The average publication date of 2006 needs to be improved.
- Fiction vs. Nonfiction
 - The collection has a good balance of fiction and nonfiction texts.
- Digital Resources
 - In addition to the digital resources provided by our school, our students have access to 1,259 juvenile texts through Sora and 911 juvenile texts through Destiny.
- Categories of Concern
 - This collection is in need of more easy books as well as high interest, low level texts.

- The collection has several nonfiction sections in need of updating, including religion, social sciences, language, arts & recreation, literature, history and geography.
- The school population is 38% Hispanic and 19%, and many of our students read books in their heritage language. The collection is in need of more books written in Spanish and in Portuguese.
- Priority will be given to diverse titles
 - Purchases of new books will focus on African American and LatinX/Hispanic students and African American and LatinX/Hispanic heritage.
- Weeding focus
 - Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project as well as duplicate or worn titles in fiction and/or nonfiction.


School Analysis

Notes

- The collection has several nonfiction sections in need of updating, including religion, social sciences, language, arts & recreation, literature, history and geography. The average age of these sections is older than the district average of 2008.
- The easy section of the collection needs to be updated. The collection in need of additional high interest, low level books to support our students.
- The biography section needs to be updated to keep it relevant to our students.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Dillard Street Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Summary

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- Percentage of students in highest ethnicity vs. books with that representation
 - African American students are 22% of the school's population, however, only 1% of our collection represents this population. The media center needs more books featuring African American characters and/or nonfiction texts with African American role models.
 - African American students are 38% of the school's population, however, only 2% of our collection represents this population. The media center needs more books featuring LatinX characters and/or nonfiction texts with LatinX role models.
