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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Dillard Street ES serves 480 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 39% Hispanic and 61% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 74% White, 20% Black, 0% Native, 1% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Tiffany Smid and Assistant Principal Felicia Smith. Dillard Street ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Battle of the Books Club, Chess Club, Music Club, Drama Club, and Green Team..

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Dillard Street ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2007 and the number of books per student is 18. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Dillard Street ES does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- The average age of the collection is too old due to neglected weeking of book sets with aged titles. When weeding is completed, the average age of the collection will greatly improve.
- Weeding will focus on aged titles in the easy section and nonfiction titles.
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic and black students and their respective heritages as well as picture books.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

- The average age of the literature section is due to the publication dates of these classic tales.
- Many of the other sections need to be updated, with the goal of the average age in each section being 2008 or newer.
